

Using Language Creatively

Surprising vocabulary, figurative imagery and creative description can win even the toughest audience round by provoking mental images and emotive responses. The examples were drawn from well-known literature, famous speeches, and celebrated films.

Technique	Description	Example
Onomatopoeia	A word which imitates the natural sounds of a thing	<i>"She sang with a raspy voice"</i>
Alliteration	Several words, having the same first consonant sound	<i>"I have stood still and stopped the sound of feet"</i>
Repetition	Same words or phrases repeated	<i>"Government of the people, by the people, for the people"</i>
Simile	Makes a direct comparison between two different things. using the words "like" or "as"	<i>"Time can draw out like a blade"</i>
Metaphor	Makes an implied comparison between two unrelated things that share common characteristics	<i>"America has tossed its cap over the wall of space!"</i>
Analogy	Something is compared to something else quite different	<i>"Life is like a box of chocolates... you never know what you're gonna get!"</i>
Hyperbole	An exaggeration of ideas for the sake of emphasis	<i>"Till a' the seas gang dry, dear, and the rocks melt wi' the sun"</i>
Understatement	Make a situation seem less important than it really is	<i>"Houston, we've had a problem"</i>
Metonymy	Replaces the name of a thing with the name of something with which it is associated	<i>"The suits have walked away with our money"</i>
Parallelism	Using parts of a sentence that are grammatically the same; or similar in their construction, sound, or syllabic pattern	<i>"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness"</i>
Antithesis	Two opposite ideas are put together in a sentence to achieve a contrasting effect	<i>"Patience is bitter, but it bears sweet fruit"</i>
Hyperbaton	An inversion in the arrangement of common words	<i>Ask not what your country can do for you – ask what you can do for your country"</i>
